ASAA March Madness Alaska - A spectacle two decades strong

Despite this year's cancellation, March Madness Alaska thrives as the state's premier high school event!

In the six-plus years since retiring as Alaska School Activities Association Executive Director, Gary Matthews has run into March Madness Alaska participants of various ages a number of times.

"At a store or a restaurant, people come up and tell me they played on this team in this year and I of course do my best to remember," Matthews said with a smile. "Whether the former players played at a rural or urban school, one thing is always clear.

"The tournament and that time in their life is and was very important to them."

Two decades ago, Matthews, the ASAA executive board, officials and plenty of volunteers first implemented the idea of March Madness Alaska (MMA). High school activities deserved a grand stage, something to really anticipate, and basketball made the most sense.

"ASAA and its board wanted to have a premier event, a real flagship," said Don Winchester, a longtime volunteer, booster and arguably the state's foremost sports historian. "A common thread through all of Alaska is basketball. It ties the whole state together, so creating this version of the tournament became a natural thing." MMA 2020 was going to salute the last 20 or so of the Alaska state basketball championships' 60-year history. But the two weeks worth of celebration and game action were officially cancelled March 14 to reduce the possibility of spreading COVID-19 (coronavirus).

"Cancelling a state tournament is not something we take lightly," ASAA said in a statement. "We recognize that for many students this opportunity will not come again.

"However, we prioritize the health of our students, coaches, school staffs, fans and elders over the want to determine this year's champions."

While this year's tournament is a no-go, it doesn't diminish the spectacle that MMA has become and will likely continue to be in the future.

In its current form, the basketball extravaganza consists of about 100 basketball and cheer squads embarking on Anchorage's Alaska Airlines Center over the course of eight days. That amounts to ASAA's estimates of more than 1,200 student participants, 250 staff members and 125-plus volunteers.

"It's really been an excellent event for those of us in the villages and the entire state," said Ramona Rock, a longtime resident of Point Hope and coach of the Tikigaq Harpoonerettes.

Point Hope is an Inupiat village located on the coast of the Chukchi Sea, about 700 miles northwest of Anchorage. The Harpoonerettes have won five Class 2A girls state titles and have historically been in the championship mix. Days before the 2020 cancellation became



official, Rock talked about the prospect of qualifying for and playing in the state tournament. She agreed an appearance at March Madness Alaska always motivates high school athletes like the ones from Point Hope.

"The power went out in the village not long ago and we had practice," Rock said. "None of the girls left the gym to go home. Instead they all turned on the lights on their phones and we practiced. You can't teach that kind of desire."

MMA has taken on a few different forms since ASAA first secured the original copyrighted title from the Illinois High School Association. A fee of \$10 first gained ASAA a three-year license to the naming rights.

"At first it was only Class 3A and 4A under the same roof," Winchester said. "The 1A and 2A tournaments were held in separate Anchorage schools. We did the large schools in Fairbanks for a couple of years before the move was made to Anchorage's Sullivan Arena.

"You could see the popularity in terms of the fan interest and the number of people who would come to town."

Winchester said the ASAA board wasn't initially keen on the idea of the smaller 1A and 2A schools playing in arenas like the Sullivan and the Alaska Airlines Center.

"The first thought was about possible embarrassment with those teams playing in front of small crowds in the big space," Winchester said. "But the potential for real growth was there. We all agreed that we wanted to offer a great experience for everyone and never really looked back." A 2001 East Anchorage High graduate, Tom Marriage was part of some powerhouse squads. The Thunderbirds won state crowns in 1999 and 2000. Marriage's senior year saw East lose the 4A finale to upstart Kodiak in one of the state's most memorable sporting events.

It wasn't the finish he wanted, but the significance of MMA and playing under the then bright lights of the Sullivan weren't lost on Marriage and his teammates.

"I mean we were playing games

on the same floor used for the Great Alaska Shootout, things were being televised statewide, it was the coolest thing," said Marriage, 37. "Some games had been played in front of packed high school gyms. But the Sully and now the Alaska Airlines Center, it offers you a glimpse of the next tier, what college basketball would look like."

Marriage currently works in advertising. As a member of the Visit Anchorage board, he's had the chance to recently deliver Player of the Game awards at March Madness.

"We should be commemorating the March Madness Alaska brand and all it embodies," he said. "As a kid growing up, I admired the guys before me like Trajan Langdon, Ma'o Tosi and Carlos Boozer down in the Juneau.

"I'm appreciative of the opportunity I was given."

In some ways, the March Madness Alaska celebration can now stretch on as ASAA and the state look forward to the 2021 edition despite the disappointment of the 2020 tournament's cancellation. Winchester said MMA marks another era in Alaska's sports history. The famed NCAA men's basketball tournament has changed. It started out with 16 teams and now has 68, 2020 cancellation notwithstanding.

"Alaska high school sports and basketball have different eras and we're not diminishing anything that came before March Madness Alaska," he said. "Now everything seems a bit bigger so you're seeing teams and players play harder and that much better.

"March Madness Alaska is off and running."

MAKING IT ASAA & FIRST NATIONAL BANK ALASKA



The excitement of a Friday evening game. Opening night applause. Friendships formed at early morning practice.

When you think of your fondest high school memories, chances are they took place outside the classroom. And you're not alone. Sports, the arts and other extracurricular activities are deeply ingrained in the high school experience. According to federal census data, more than 44 percent of American kids ages 12 to 17 participate in sports, and 29 percent participate in other clubs.

In Alaska, there's one organization working behind the scenes to organize dozens of those activities: The Alaska School Activities Association. Commonly known as ASAA, this nonprofit strives to provide every student the opportunity to grow and learn through activities that range from athletic to academic, traditional to technological.

"We see ourselves as an extension of the school day," said ASAA Executive Director Billy Strickland. "A lot of those things that you're learning in the classroom, you get to go apply in real-life settings." And the lessons often follow students for a lifetime -- long after their high school days have passed.

The football family

Talk to anyone who's ever played football at Chugiak High School and they'll recognize the name Tom Huffer. But you might need to clarify which one you're talking about.

First there's Tom Huffer Sr., a former college football player who landed in Alaska courtesy of the U.S. Army. After leaving the service, Huffer went into education with one objective in mind: He wanted to coach. When Chugiak was a brand-new school, Huffer helped start its very first football team, and he's been a part of Mustang football nearly every season since as a coach, parent, grandparent, or proud fan. It wasn't always easy.

"We didn't win too many the first seven years," Huffer said. In fact, "we got hammered quite hard."



That started to change in the late 1970s, and in the '80s, Chugiak grew into an Alaska football powerhouse, winning multiple state and conference titles.

"That's when Tom Jr. enters the picture, of course," Huffer said.

Tom Huffer Jr. -- known as "Huff" to his friends, and simply as "Junior" to his dad -- was the first Alaska football player to be selected for all-state honors in three positions (kicker, tight end and linebacker) two years in a row. He was a state wrestling champion, too, followed 16 years later by his younger brother John-Paul, another standout high school football player who is now on Chugiak's coaching staff.

"All of us were involved with ASAA from day one," Tom Huffer Sr. said. "They just do good things for kids."

And not just kids who play football, Huffer Jr. added.

"My son was big-time into playing instruments in the band," Huffer Jr. said. "That became a big thing in his life. There are so many opportunities that ASAA promotes in music, in debate and drama, in mock trial stuff. There are so many things that they help with that support every single kid. That's awesome."

Activities for all

Formed in 1956, before statehood, ASAA was originally established to unify two regional high school sports organizations in the Territory of Alaska. As schools grew following statehood and the oil boom, ASAA was formally organized under the state Department of Education and Early Childhood in the 1970s and funded by the state.

That funding was abruptly cut in 1986, when Alaska experienced a severe economic downturn. The ASAA board voted to incorporate as a 501(c)(3) nonprofit independent of the state, but it took time to work out the legal and financial arrangements. Today, state statute allows Alaska school districts to become dues-paying members of ASAA as long as the association upholds specific organizational standards, but at the time, the future looked uncertain for high school activities in Alaska.



"When we lost state funding in '86, the association kind of muddled along for about a three-year period," Strickland said. "Then the bank really came in and basically rescued us."

First National Bank Alaska signed on as ASAA's first-ever title sponsor in 1989, contributing financially and providing employee volunteers at championship events. Other corporate sponsorships eventually began to follow the bank's example. It's an important source of income for an organization that, like the state itself, has a "three-legged stool" revenue structure.

"Generally speaking, about a third of our budget is school dues," Strickland said. "About a third of our budget is tournament gate revenue, and about a third is corporate sponsorships."

That final third -- sponsorships -- is important because it helps ASAA keep activities affordable and accessible to all students. First National's 30-year title sponsorship has also made it possible for ASAA to elevate experiences for students from every community in Alaska -- hosting state tournaments at the Alaska Airlines Center or bringing in out-of-state guest conductors for the all-state music ensembles, for example.

"It allows us to do more for our students, provide more services to our member schools, without having to increase school dues or increase the entry fees at state tournaments," Strickland said.

Absent that sponsor support, most tournaments would operate at a loss. But the organization's mission is to involve students, not make money.

"We're not about providing a return to our shareholders," Strickland said. "We're trying to get students motivated to achieve some goal. That's motivating (them) to keep (their) grades up, to have good attendance, to have good behavior in school." In the long run, he added, that's good for everyone in Alaska.

"Ultimately it's helping our state have community members that are more productive and being the kind of citizen you want," Strickland said. "Our goal is to make the student better while a student and in their adult lives as well. We want every student to have an opportunity to participate in an activity that's going to help them develop these positive life skills.

The benefits of being involved

Activities aren't just good clean fun. Teachers will tell you they're a powerful tool to promote positive behaviors and academics. Students have to stay out of trouble and maintain a minimum grade point average of 2.0 to participate in ASAA activities.

"You learn self-discipline," said Huffer Jr., who was inducted into ASAA's Alaska High School Hall of Fame in 2011, the same class as Stanley Cup winner Scott Gomez and Olympic gold medalist Kikkan Randall. "That's probably the biggest. You learn how to work with people and understand other people's ideas and opinions."

Studies have also shown that involvement in school activities directly affects students' perception of their schools and consequently improves their academic achievement.

"If you can get a kid involved in sports, that keeps them grounded, keeps them involved with other people," Huffer Sr. said. "It makes a better experience for the kid, better overall education."

And it's not just sports, Huffer Sr. added. His name might be on Chugiak's football stadium, but as a former school counselor, he's seen firsthand the importance of helping a student discover what they personally get excited about.

"Whatever a kid's passion is, it's an important part of what we do and what we are," he said.

Students who are engaged in multiple ways -- academic, social, extracurricular -- are more likely to succeed academically and less likely to drop out. Those benefits are especially meaningful in Alaska, which has a high school graduation rate that's significantly lower than the national average -- and another reason it's important that ASAA offers so many different programs.

"We have a wide variety of activities that we offer, with the intent of making it really hard for a student not to find something that they can get excited about," Strickland said. "We pride ourselves on being an activities association, not just an athletic association."

In recent years, Huffer Sr. helped develop a girls' flag football program that has proven to be tremendously popular. There's "mix six" coed volleyball, too, which is a hit with small schools that have a hard time filling teams. ASAA also has programs in drama, debate and forensics; music; world language; student government; and even esports.

"As society evolves and as different activities become popular, we've tried to kind of stay on what is going to keep the students motivated," Strickland said. "We're always looking at things that will increase participation."

That motivation leads to growth, according to Huffer Jr., who has watched his own three children and countless of his student athletes grow through school activities.

"I saw a lot of individual kids really go from point A to point B, to where they wanted to be," Huffer Jr. said. "To me, it was really satisfying, watching these kids progress with what they wanted to do."

And he knows from his own experience as an ASAA student athlete that those experiences have a lasting impact. Now retired, Huffer Jr. still credits ASAA activities with giving him a strong foundation for life.

"It's really helped me become the person -- the family man and coach and person -- I am," he said. "Without (ASAA), kids wouldn't have these opportunities. That's the bottom line."

ACS standout caps career with player of the year award

Destiny Reimers put together a four-year career at Anchorage Christian School that is going to be pretty hard to top.

During her time at ACS, the four-year starter helped lead the Lions to a 118-5 record in 123 career games. She finished her prep career with 1,775 points, 652 rebounds, 608 assists, 363 steals and 56. Reimers and the Lions earned four Southcentral Conference titles and three 3A girls state championships.

There was only one thing missing. The top honor. And now she can add that to her list.

Reimers has been named the Wasilla Lithia Dodge/Alaska Basketball Coaches Association 3A Player of the Year.

ACS has built a tradition of producing all-state caliber basketball talent. But Reimers has attributes that separate her from the pack, ACS head coach Chad Dyson said.

"Her leadership abilities," Dyson said. "She's able to make all the players around her better."

And that's something Reimers wants to do, Dyson said.

"She finds joy in making players around her better," Dyson said.

Reimers never missed a game as a four-year starter for the Lions after stepping in and producing immediately as a freshman at ACS. Reimers is now ready to take the next step in her playing career. The ACS senior committed to UAF and will play for the Nanooks in the fall.

Dyson believes Reimers can make an immediate impact once again.

"I think it's a great fit," Dyson said.

Dyson said he believes that could be a four-year starter for the Nanooks. Reimers obviously has the athletic talent. But Dyson said it also has to do with Reimers' work ethic and attention to the game.

"She's a student of the game," Dyson said. "She's not just a player that shows up for game time."

Dyson said Reimers is a coachable athlete who is eager to learn.

Off the floor, Reimers has a 4.0 grade point average at ACS.

Work ethic drives Valdez senior, 3A's top player

Valdez boys basketball coaching Todd Wegner has been leading players on the hardwood for nearly three decades

"In 28 years of coaching, I only have a handful of kids I'd probably say are the most special players I've had," Wegner said. Valdez senior Jalen Freeman is on that list.

"Jalen, on and off the court, leads by example," Wegner said. "He's quiet in nature, but his work ethic is far and above anything I've seen. He's been very special to me the last four years."

Wegner is not the only coach who has noticed Freeman's impact. Freeman has been named the Wasilla Lithia Dodge/ Alaska Association of Basketball Coaches 3A Player of the Year. Wegner said Freeman was the leader of a young Buccaneers squad during the 2019-20 season.

"Jalen was always given the toughest defensive assignment," Wegner said. "This year he was always face guarded full court by a couple of people."

But that didn't stop Freeman.

"I never saw him get rattled," Wegner said. "He doesn't show

any emotion with regard to frustration ever."

That composure helped the entire team, Wegner said. "Especially with a young team, he brought a calmness," Wegner said. "He brought consistency to our team."

Freeman hit a career milestone as a senior, passing the 1,000 career points mark during the Palmer Elks Showdown tournament at Palmer High School. Freeman averaged about 18 points and nearly seven rebounds a game as a senior, and finished his career with more than 1,200 total points in a Valdez uniform.

Wegner said Freeman does want to continue his basketball career at the next level, and should have a number of options. Wegner said he believes Freeman has the ability to play at the Division II level, but a junior college could also be an option.

Wegner compared Freeman to former Grace Christian standout Tobin Karlberg, who is now at UAA.

"He reminds me a lot of Karlberg. I always loved his work ethic, the time he put in," Wegner said. "You are starting to see the fruits of (Karlberg's) labor. You can tell he's been putting in the time in the offseason, and his game has improved."

Wegner said he can see Freeman at either guard spot in college.

"He can handle it, he can distribute. He's fast enough defensively. He's probably one of the better defenders in the state," Wegner said.

Lathrop head coach David Stewart has a staff of assistants. But during the 2019-20 season, Stewart had a secret weapon, a player who was essentially a coach on the floor.

Senior Ella Roberts.

"Communication is everything," Stewart said.

Having Roberts, with her ability to consistently communicate on the floor was a big reason Lathrop finished the regular season 18-2, Stewart said.

"She was the nucleus of our team," Stewart said.

Now, Roberts has been recognized as one of the top players in the state. The senior has been named to the Wasilla Lithia Dodge/Alaska Association of Basketball Coaches 4A All-State first team.

"I felt like it was a great fit for her," Stewart said.

Stewart said he believes Roberts will make an immediate impact.

"I think she's going to go there and right away become a big factor," Stewart said.

Ketchikan standout caps career as the Kings' all-time leading scorer

As a junior Chris Lee was part of a senior-laden Ketchikan Kings squad that stormed its way through a historic run to the 4A state title. But as Ketchikan entered the 2019-20 prep basketball season, the Kings sported a very different look.

"We lost eight guys. We basically had two returners," Ketchikan head coach Eric Stockhausen said.

But as a senior, Lee, Ketchikan's standout, took the team under his wing.

"(Chris) led us to a much better record than most people would have figured," Stockhausen said. "He had to be our best defender, best post player, best passer, best shooter."

And Lee did all of the above, and he has been recognized for his effort. Lee has been named to the Wasilla Lithia Dodge/Alaska Basketball Coaches Association All-State first-team.

"Watching him go from state champ to basically starting practice with a bunch of guys who had never been in our practice before, he was the mentor, he was the motivator, he was everything," Stockhausen said. "All the pressure was put upon him."

But Lee wore that pressure like a badge of honor.

"It's a testament to his work ethic and his drive," Stockhausen said. Stockhausen said Lee showed that in every practice and workout.

"He is the consummate competitor. He wants to win. It happens in

every drill," Stockhausen said.

And the results showed on the court. He averaged 26.7 points and 8.5 rebounds per game, while shooting 49 percent from the field.

"He was double- and triple-teamed. He had to play the full 94 feet. He did it without ever getting a break," Stockhausen said. "It was amazing what he was able to do."

Lee also etched his named in the Ketchikan record books. He scored 668 points as a senior, which set a new school record for a single season. He also set the career mark with 1,911 total points. Former Kings standout Steve Ortiz had owned the prior record - 1,788 points - for 46 years. Stockhausen said Lee really matured as a senior.

"I've coached 29 years and I haven't seen many kids grow like he did in one season," Stockhausen said.

Stockhausen said Lee plans to play at the next level. Lee is drawing interest from Division II programs such as UAA. Junior college programs have also shown interest.
